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## LEYLA ACAROGLU BECOMES CIRCULAR AUSTRALIA'S CHIEF CIRCULAR DESIGNER

Dr Acaroglu is an Australian designer who works globally with a roster of high caliber companies and organizations, providing her expertise in designing out waste from the economy, helping products stay in use for as long as possible and creating systems-based solutions that support a waste-free world through the transition to a circular economy.

Circular Australia has appointed Leyla as its first Chief Circular Designer to help Australian businesses and governments design out waste within their own products and practices, keeping valuable materials from being buried or burnt, and to raise awareness and training on the circular economy.

Leyla will work with Circular Australia on some exciting new projects, including raising the profile of design as a critical way to achieve a circular economy.

A circular economy aims to redefine growth, focusing on positive society-wide benefits. Decoupling economic activity from the consumption of finite resources, and designing waste out of the system, it is based on three principles: 1. Design out waste and pollution 2. Keep products and materials in use longer. 3. Regenerate and restore natural systems.

The value of the Australia circular economy is estimated to be \$1.9 trillion.

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
